SCHOOL COUNCIL NEWS


The final meeting of our school council for 2023 will be held on Friday 4th December at 6pm. The venue for this meeting will be confirmed soon.

BUSHFIRE AT RISK REGISTER

We wish to inform our school community that our school is included on the Bushfire At Risk Register, as set by the Education Department, for the 2022-2023 Summer. This means that our school is required to close on days declared as Catastrophic in the Northern Country Bureau of Meteorology district.

Catastrophic days are announced by the Emergency Management Commissioner of Victoria, usually no later than 1.00pm on the day preceding the declared Catastrophic day. Once a Catastrophic day is announced, our school will notify all families that the school will be closed.

We again remind families to setup the UEducateUs App on their phone to ensure that they are receiving important information that may be communicated by the school.
